


## Cowboy words

spur - a pointed piece of metal, often shaped like a star, on the back of a cowboy's boot




stagecoach - a small carriage pulled by horses

varmint - c bad person




There were eight calves.

Johnny's pa branded each one with a little picture of a spur.


Easy there, Clementine! "Now folks will know they belong to us," said Johnny's pa.

Johnny followed the sneaky rustler back to his ranch.

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
Hank pulled the calf into a barn. Johnny could clearly see the Spur mark on the calf.



Moments later, Hank and the calf came out. But now the calf had the Horseshoe mark.




Johnny crept into the barn. He noticed some cans of paint on top of a barrel.

his rain dance," smiled Johnny.




Chief Running Water began to dance. It was a special dance to ask the sky spirits for rain.
